


What is a UIP?

Unified Improvement Plan

The Unified Improvement Plan (UIP) was introduced in 2009 to all schools and districts in Colorado to streamline school and district efforts to meet a variety of state and federal improvement planning requirements.

The UIP reduces the total number of separate plans schools and districts are required to complete, with the intent of creating a single plan that has true meaning for local stakeholders.





What is a UIP?

What a UIP Is	What a UIP Is Not
The school's plan for getting from where they are to where they want to be as a school	The 'kitchen sink' of everything the school does
A continuous improvement process grounded in data	Showing all the steps taken in the process for improvement
A publicly transparent documentation of the decisions and processes as to how the school will improve

Student Performance Priorities

Colorado Department of Education asks us to identify Student Performance Priorities according to the following guidelines:

- Using student outcome data, such as academic performance, attendance and behavior
- At the appropriate magnitude
 - The SPPs should reflect improvement needed for the most amount of students
- Only including 2-3 SPPs
 - This ensures a narrow focus for the plan so that the school can work deeply towards improving a few highly important priorities, rather than dividing efforts towards many priorities and limiting the ability to improve data to the extent needed



Our School Leadership Team considered the following data points as possible Student Performance Priorities: **Data Points**

Student Engagement

Chronic Absenteeism: $22-23 (60\%) \rightarrow Winter (37\%)/May (49\%)$ Jazmyne suggested: Think of a way to connect to Class Dojo to the office instead of having to only call the front office- attendance line.

BESS- 23-24 (77% Normal, 16% Elevated, 2% Extremely Elevated)

Achievement & Growth (Literacy)

3-5th CMAS

- 10% Meeting/Exceeding in Literacy
- 47% MGP

Seijas: Mentioned the connection between.

Achievement & Growth (Literacy)

3-5th CMAS

- 10% Meeting/Exceeding in Literacy
- 58% MGP

Student Performance Priority 1	Low achievement and growth in K-5 Literacy
Student Performance Priority 2	Low achievement and growth in 3-5 Math
Student Performance Priority 3	Low Student Engagement

Root Causes

Colorado Department of Education asks us to identify Root Causes according to the following guidelines:

- School systems that need to be improved, and can be improved
- School systems that, when improved, will improve the SPPs previously identified
 - This does not include all the systems that the school may need to improve, but only the ones that will improve the Student Performance Priorities.
 - This allows the plan to have a narrow focus so that the school can work deeply towards improving student outcomes
- Systems that are within control of the school
 - This does not include student health issues, transportation concerns, or other things that the school has minimal to no control over.

Root Cause #1: Student Engagement & Systems

- Attendance
- Social Emotional Supports
- Classroom Tier 1 Behaviors

Artrenia: When the student is misbehaving. Why don't the parents have consequences when the students?

Answer: Teachers should be contacting at first behavior. 3rd incident come and sit with the students.

Answer: Have a contract with these behavioral understanding. Holding the parents accountable. Give it out at the end of the year, and then give it at the beginning of the year. Then parents cannot say that they didn't year.

Answer: Communication lapses with home. Kids act different at school, then with their parents. Also, parent involvement-parents aren't knowing. A student was acting out in the hallway and we have to nip those things in the bud right away.

Answer: We need

Answer: Contract that parents will have a certain amount of involvement. Perhaps we track the hours of involvement. (At least 3 hours.)

Answer: The Sterling Volunteer system has become intimidating. There was a large presence of parents at one time. How can we let parents know at that time?

Answer: They ask for your SS #. There is no place to omit them.

Answer: Perhaps we can have an event around it. Sterling Table Set up for all events. (Back 2 School)

Answer: If needs a SS#- opportunities that don't require Sterling. (They can give something to the school.)

Answer: We can send things home with students for them to do activities at home to contribute to the school. (Cut up items.

The Office can communicate about the copies.)

Answer: Explain that option to parents. Answer: Let Migrant Families know
